The Mount Sinai Journal of Medicine offers several prizes for manuscripts published in *The Journal* during the previous year and judged by an awards committee to be outstanding contributions to the medical literature. The 1999 Joseph Globus Award, established in honor of the first and long-time editor of *The Journal*, is for the best overall paper on a clinical topic. The award goes to Harold C. Sox, M.D., for his paper "Current Controversies in Screening: Cholesterol, Breast Cancer, and Prostate Cancer," Volume 66, No. 2, pp. 91–101.

The 1999 Ralph Colp Award, in honor of the memory of a distinguished chief of surgery at The Mount Sinai Hospital, for the best paper on a surgical topic, goes to Nelson N. Stone, M.D. and Richard G. Stock, M.D., for their paper "Laparoscopic Pelvic Lymph Node Dissection in the Staging of Prostate Cancer," Volume 66, No. 1, pp. 26–30.

The 1999 Student Award, for the best paper submitted by a medical student, goes to Nina Desai, for her paper "Intussusception in Adults," with Michael G. Wayne, M.D., Peter J. Taub, M.D., Marc A. Levitt, M.D., Renee Spiegel, M.D., and Unsup Kim, M.D., Volume 66, No. 5, pp. 336–340.

On behalf of the Editorial Staff, I am delighted to recognize the outstanding scholarship and contributions of our 1999 awardees to medicine in general, and to *The Mount Sinai Journal of Medicine* in particular.
